The nine seniors on the Parry McCluer High School basketball team put forth an amazing last hurrah on Saturday. The Fighting Blues won their third consecutive state championship, defeating Surry County 58-45 in the Class 1 finals at Virginia Commonwealth University's Siegel Center in Richmond.

With the championship, the Blues (26-4) became just the fifth Virginia High School League girls' team - and the first from Timesland - to win at least three consecutive titles.

"It's been an unbelievable ride," said ninth-year PM head coach Adam Gilbert. "This is historic. This doesn't happen."

Reflecting on what it was like for his players to go for the last two state titles with targets on their backs, Gilbert said, "When they won it as sophomores, everybody thought we had a chance to do it the following year and the year after. It's not that easy, and this year has proven that. We played some really good teams throughout the season."

In last year's finals, the Blues defeated Surry 51-42. The year before, PM eliminated the Cougars in the semifinals 51-48.

In the rematch on Saturday with the Region 1A champions, the Blues trailed late in the first quarter before

going on a 6-0 run into the second quarter, leading by as many as 15 (30-15) in the period before the Cougars (26-5) cut the lead to 30-19 by halftime. PM used its defensive press, going from full-court to half-court man-to-man defense to fend off a second-half comeback by the Cougars . The Blues' pressure defense forced 20 Surry turnovers.

"We wanted to get turnovers, but, more or less, get to their legs," Gilbert said. "Everything that I'd seen, film-wise, game-wise, they didn't have a deep bench. ... The game was tight late. Hopefully our endurance, our depth would prevail. The turnovers were a benefit. ... Great defensive effort on our part." Indeed, Surry dressed just seven players, while the Blues got all 11 players into the game.

Gilbert said the Cougars "fought hard the whole ball game, but these kids are resilient, and I've learned not to bet against them. It doesn't matter how tight the game gets. They're cool, calm and collected, no matter the situation. They were able to hold off those runs and finish the game the way it should've been finished from our end, so I'm really proud of them." Madison Dunlap led all players with 25 points, scoring 16 in the first half, and she made two 3-pointers and grabbed six rebounds. From the floor, she shot 50 percent (9-of-18). Dunlap found her shot early, helping the Blues go on that second-quarter run.

Dunlap said she stepped up because she had the end goal in mind of winning the championship. "We're focused more on a team effort than individual," she said. "Of course, I wanted to play well, but I would prefer us to just win overall."

Dunlap and nearly all of her senior teammates have been playing sports together since they were in fifth grade, and it became apparent when they began winning basketball tournaments as seventh-graders that this group was destined for more success at the high school level. "Going for the three-peat, I couldn't

PM Girls Handle Honaker *Strong Third Quarter Allows Blues To Pull Away*

The Parry McCluer High School girls basketball team used a strong third quarter to pull away from a close game, defeating Honaker 48-31 in the Class 1 state semifinals on Tuesday of last week at Roanoke College's Cregger Center in Salem.

Only trailing briefly early on, the Fighting Blues led 12-6 after the first quarter before taking a 21-15 lead into halftime. PM started the second half on a 10-2 run, applying its defensive press and outscoring the Tigers 18-8 in the third period to take a 16-point lead into the fourth quarter. The Blues led by as many as 18 in the fourth quarter, and Region 1D champion Honaker (26-3) never threatened a comeback. With their press and man-to-man defense, the Blues forced 15 Honaker turnovers.

Addressing what allowed the Blues to build up the big lead in the third quarter, PM head coach Adam Gilbert said, "The ball bounced our way a little bit. We got some steals, got some layups. The shots started falling. It was a good quarter for us."

Madison Dunlap led PM with 15 points and nine rebounds, sinking two 3-pointers. Prior to Dunlap's 25 points and six rebounds in the state finals, Gilbert said, "This was her best performance of the postseason. Our seniors stepped up big for us. Emma Camden has been the star for us off the bench, and I thought she continued to do that tonight, but it was nice to see Madison have a big game. No better time to have it."

Peyton Mohler added 11 points, five assists and four rebounds for the Blues, while Makenna Smith chipped in eight points and held Honaker's leading scorer, LeeAnna McNulty, to 16 points. McNulty was averaging 24 points per game this season. No other Tiger scored in double figures, as Morgan Duty was Honaker's second highest scorer with seven points. Camden chipped in six points on two 3-pointers for PM. Showing their unselfishness, the Blues dished out 11 assists, while Honaker had five.

On the assignment of defending McNulty, Smith said, "She is one of the tougher players I've had to guard, and I give her credit, but I just tried to deny her the ball, tried to stay in front her, because I know she's a big part of her team. I just tried to limit her touches." Praising his team's defense, Gilbert said the Tigers "are great shooters. We can't give them too much space, but I thought we did a really good job covering [McNulty]. She got a lot of buckets there in transition, some putbacks, but I thought we did a good job on the boards tonight. A good effort all the way around defensively." The Blues shot 5-of-13 (38.5 percent) from three-point range, with Camden making two treys, while holding Honaker to 0-8 shooting from beyond the arc. Of her own two 3-pointers, Dunlap said, "I normally play an inside game, but today I stepped out, and I wasn't pressured as much, so I just shot." The game was quite physical, with the Blues grabbing 27 rebounds to Honaker's 22. "You've got to be willing to take it," Gilbert said. "I think that's a credit to our strength and conditioning coach that we have." Gilbert was referring to PM athletic director Ron Loy, who Gilbert said "does a tremendous job with our players." The Blues and Tigers met two years ago in the Region 1C semifinals, when the Blues won 61-52 en route to claiming their first state title. Gilbert said he believes Honaker will continue to be a force to be reckoned with in the future. "This is a completely different team," he said. "They're young and athletic, and they're going to be good the next two years." Addressing the difference in experience, Honaker head coach Misty Miller said, "Nine seniors compared to my one junior and sophomores and freshmen, the maturity and the experience that they have in the game definitely is a factor." "We're a young team," Miller continued. "I think the pressure that they put on us was hard for us. ... We turned the ball over, and they got a little bit of a lead." Gilbert also acknowledged how the Blues' experience helped. He compared the PM team of three years ago to Honaker. Back then, the Blues were mostly freshmen who lost in the state semifinals 49-33 to eventual champion Northwood. "That experience, you can't make that up," he said. "You can't explain it to anybody unless you've been there and done it. I remember when these guys were freshmen and we were on Cloud Nine, and we thought we were the big dogs. We walked into VCU, and Northwood showed us what a big dog was."

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imagine any other group of girls," Dunlap said. "We've been together so long. Just to end it this way was the right way to go out."

The Blues scored most of their points from the free throw line in the closing minutes. As their lead grew to double digits, their many fans, dressed in blue, chanted, "Three-peat."

Dunlap's senior teammates stepped up, as Emma Camden added 17 points and five steals, and Peyton Mohler had 10 points and a team-high eight rebounds. Allison Coleman chipped in three points, Hailey Huffman grabbed seven rebounds to go along with two points, and Makenna Smith had six rebounds and one point.

Bre'cha Byrd led the Cougars with 17 points and had nine rebounds, helping fuel Surry's second-half comeback, and Alexis Nelson chipped in eight points, a game-high 10 boards and four blocks. Jasmyn Pierce added seven points for Surry.

Surry head coach Chris Brown, in his second year with the Cougars, offered several reasons why the Blues were such a tough team to beat. "They know each other," he said. When teammates have played together for so long, he said, "The continuity of that is something that you can't buy, you can't trade out. They battle. They're tough defensively. They work well together. They run their sets, and they're a good team."

He said PM's press was difficult to handle, but, in the second half, the Cougars "found a seam in their press, getting the ball to the middle, to [Byrd], and to come down and duplicate that, that's what I was looking for. But Parry McCluer, they make adjustments. They would change the way that they would approach it, from a full-court to a half-court [press], going man, and it'll keep you off-balance."

Praising his team, which loses three seniors and should contend for the state title again next year, Brown said, "At the end of the day, it didn't go quite the way I wanted it to, but I'm just very proud of these girls and their effort."

"We lost to a very good team," Brown added. "They're not three-time state champions for nothing.

Gilbert noted that, while the Blues coasted throughout much of the regular season, they played and lost to Class 3 state champion Spotswood twice, playing the Blazers close the second time. The Blues' other losses were against Class 3 state semifinalist Lord Botetourt and Class 5 state quarterfinalist William Fleming, but they beat Class 2 state champion Wise County Central. "It's been a challenging year for them, to say the least, but they were able to use those games and propel them to the point that we're at," Gilbert said.

While showing his appreciation and pride for his players and assistant coaches Katelin Gilbert, Conrad Patterson and Katy Patterson, Gilbert also thanked the fans from the Buena Vista community for showing their support. "From the state tournament on, we get escorted out of town with fire trucks and the police department, and we get escorted back into town," he said. "It's pretty special. The community really gets around these kids, their athletics, and they'll come out and support. I thought today, for a Saturday, at 11 o'clock in the morning, we had a really good crowd." Over the last four years, the Blues won over 100 games, four Pioneer District championships, two Region 1C championships, and three state titles. They made the state semifinals when the current seniors were freshmen, losing to eventual state champion Northwood. For the senior class, all but Camden were there for the three state titles. Camden transferred from Rockbridge County High School for her junior and senior seasons. Mohler is the one PM player who has committed to playing college basketball. She signed with Division II school Davis & Elkins College in December. Gilbert noted that Dunlap received several Division II offers but chose to go to Virginia Tech. Mohler and Dunlap both passed the 1,000-point mark this season, and Mohler is the Blues' all-time leader for assists. All nine seniors had offers from at least the Division III level. The Blues will also graduate Smith, Coleman, Huffman, Maggie Patterson, Jayla Baker and Tristen Clark. PM's only freshman, Katie Claytor, showed great potential this season, and got into the state finals late in the fourth quarter, as did the Blues' Lithuanian exchange student, junior Ugne Pelikyte, who will have some exciting basketball stories to tell back home. Before the game, Gilbert said, his message to his players was "not to be emotional. You have your senior nights, and senior nights are awful. I don't like senior nights. Everybody's snotting and sneezing all over each other, and it's kind of hard to play with that mindset. Parents are going to be parents. Family's going to be family. You see posts on Facebook: 'This is the last time we're going to do this. ... I love my baby." Gilbert said that support is great, but he told his players, "We've got to block that stuff out. You can be emotional after the game's over with, and give these kids credit. They did that. They understood the task at hand, and they went out and did it. I couldn't be prouder of them." Dunlap said the emotions hit her and the other Blues' leaders when they were taken out of the game with about a minute left, as Gilbert allowed the fans to recognize them. "When we were sitting on the bench, we couldn't help but just cry because it was our last time doing it and the last buzzer we'll ever hear, playing together, but we just tried to take it all in," Dunlap said.

Facing the top competition in the country, Rockbridge County High School senior female thrower Danielle Crawford

placed 14th of 44 individuals in the shot put at the New Balance Nationals Indoor



track and CRAWFORD field meet on Friday.

Competing at the Amory Track and Field Facility in New York City, Crawford had a personalrecord throw of 38 feet, 10.5 inches, which broke her own school record by half an inch. She'd set the previous school record in early December at the first indoor meet of the winter season, the Commonwealth Games Invitational at Liberty University, where she'd qualified for the national meet.

Each individual not advancing to the finals got three throws at the national meet, and Crawford's best throw was her last one. Her throw was about 5.5 feet shy of the winning mark of 44-4, recorded by Megan Mann of Lee-Davis.

Summing up the meet, Crawford said, "The national meet was an amazing experience. It was exciting to compete against girls that were from all around the U.S."

Joining Crawford for the trip were her father and throwing coach, Chris; her mother, Lucinda; and RC head track and field coach Jennifer Showalter. While in New York, they visited The Today Show.

Crawford won the indoor state shot put championship on Feb. 23, becoming RC's first athlete to win a state throwing title. Her mark at the Class 3 state meet was 38-7. For the spring, Crawford will

With the start of the 2019 sports season, our local high schools welcome six new head coaches, four for Rockbridge County and two for Parry McCluer. All six are familiar faces to those in the sports community.

RC welcomes Susan Nye as its new girls lacrosse coach, Robert Hull as the new boys la-

crosse coach, Sean Harrington for girls soccer and Andy Coffey for girls tennis. The new head girls tennis coach for PM is Rad Patterson, and the Blues' new boys tennis coach is Garrett Turner.



NYE Nye is returning

for a second stint as the Rockbridge County High School girls lacrosse coach. Nye, who teaches in the Department of Kinesiology at James Madison University, takes over for Chris Bowring.

Nye was the program's first-ever varsity mentor. Fresh off of finishing up an All-American playing career at Roanoke College - where she also competed in volleyball and basketball - she helped the Wildcats' lacrosse program transition to the varsity level and served as head coach from 1996-1998

RC went 9-8 last year, finishing as the National Conference runnerup and falling to Salem in the Region 4D semifinals. Nye believes that her familiarity with the players - she coached the Wildcats' undefeated junior varsity squad in 2018 and has also been involved with the Lex Lax Lightning youth program – will be a big benefit this spring.

"These players are amazing young women who happen to be fabulous lacrosse players," Nye said. "I have been coaching the eighth, ninth and 10th graders since they were in elementary school. Therefore, I have very high expecta-

Rexx Hallyburton capped off a breakthrough season for the Washington and Lee University wrestling team with an appearance at the ing in fifth grade, going on to compete at Lexington High School and Washington and Lee University. He was also a three-time football All-American for the Generals, earning induction into the W&L Athletics Hall of Fame.

On the lacrosse side, Hull coached at the high school level in Cleveland shortly after graduating from W&L in 1996. More recently, he got involved with the Lex Lax youth program several years ago, working with the current RC sophomore class.

The Wildcats went 9-7 last year under Jake Adams, falling to E.C. Glass in the National Conference semifinals. Hull, who will bring in Ryan Larsen and Sean Capps as assistant coaches, hopes to see RC make some big strides on the field this year.

"This 2019 season is one of transition," Hull said. "We hope to surprise some teams that take us for granted, make the playoffs, and get the community excited to come out and watch our young men who've been working hard."

There will also be a new, but familiar, face on the sideline for RC girls soccer. Now in his fourth season with the program, Harrington replaces Ray Ellington, who resigned in the fall after a successful 10-year stint with the Wildcats.

RC finished 9-7-4 last season, de-

feating Turner Ashby in the Valley District consolation match to qualify for regional play for the first time in program history. The 'Cats fell to eventual Class 3 state champion Western Albemarle in the Region 3C quar-

terfinals.



Harrington brings a wealth of coaching experience to his new position. He played for VMI from 1990-1992, and since then he's coached a number of high school, club and travel programs, ranging from the VMI women's club team to the boys varsity squad at Spotsylvania High School.

Harrington, who works as the executive assistant to the superintendent at VMI, was the Wildcats' junior varsity coach in 2016, and he spent the past two seasons as the varsity assistant. He expects RC to continue its

upward trajectory on the pitch – and he also hopes that his team can help grow the game among young players in the area.

"Our goal is to continue to improve and build upon the successes from last season, while returning to the regional tournament once again this year," Harrington said. "We are also focused on doing more within the community this season to promote girls soccer."

Coffey replaces Susan Amonette as RC's girls tennis coach. Amonette coached the Wildcats for eight years, leading the team to a 9-9 record and the Region 3C quarterfinals last year. The Wildcats won the Conference 31 title as a team in 2017, and Amonette also coached Katie Driscoll and Sullivan Ray to conference doubles crown in 2016.

"I'm just trying to keep what Susan had going," Coffey said.

Previously, Coffey was the PM girls' head coach for five years, from 2012-16, leading the Blues to the Pioneer District title in 2016 and the then-freshman dou-

bles team of Sophie Dryden and Maggie Patterson to the state semifinals.



Coffey said that, after hearing that Amonette was stepping down, a couple of the RC players asked him if he would be interested, and he contacted the athletic department about it. Coffey also enjoys playing tennis and is in his third year as a special education teacher at RC. In addition to tennis, he also has coached girls basketball, as an assistant and a junior varsity head coach for PM before serving as RC's head coach from 2016-18.

PM's new girls tennis coach, Rad Patterson, replaces Melissa Cobb, who coached the last two years before

becoming the principal at PMHS. Last year, Cobb led the Blues to a 13-2 record, the Pioneer District championship and the first regional title in school history before they lost **PATTERSON** to Class 1 state cham-

pion Auburn in the state semifinals. Under Cobb, Maggie Patterson and Ashlen Hazelwood won the state doubles title for the first state tennis title



Rad, who works as a physical education and health teacher at PM, played tennis for the Blues in the early 1980s, teaming up with Chip Lawhorne to finish third in the state in doubles. He last coached girls tennis at PM about three decades ago, and he's been an assistant basketball and football coach for about 30 years.

Looking forward to coaching the Blues, Rad said, "I've been up there watching them for the last three or four years. It's an opportunity to coach my daughter, an opportunity to give back."

Turner replaces Liza Mackey as the PM boys' tennis coach. Mackey coached for one year and led the Blues to a 2-11 record and the Region 1C/2C quarterfinals.

Turner works for the Buena Vista school district as a digital media teacher and a media specialist. He

was previously a sports director at WFXR, after earning a Bachelor's degree in business journalism from Baylor University in 2009 and a master's degree from Emerson College in 2012.



Originally from

Missouri, after Turner and his wife moved to Virginia, they "fell in love with Buena Vista and Parry McCluer during my time working in local television in Roanoke," he said. "Their fan base and the people I've gotten to know are really what drew me here."

While Turner has not played tennis for a team or coached tennis before, he coached middle school boys and girls basketball this winter. He said PM athletic director Ron Loy asked him to coach, and Turner agreed. "For me, being prepared is a big thing and to coach a sport you have never played is a challenge. I especially don't want to let the kids down, but Mr. Loy had faith in me," he said. "I have five seniors on this team and they know how to play, so my job is to make sure every day at practice they're taking every minute of it seriously so they can succeed in their matches."

continued from page A10 son. Camden has averaged double figures in scoring as a substitute, while Coleman, Tristen Clark, Jayla Baker and Katie Claytor have all provided a spark at different points throughout the year.

Camden was instant offense on Friday, scoring seven points during an early 11-0 run that put PM ahead 16-4 with 2:46 to go in the first quarter. Coming off the bench may even be an advantage for the senior guard.

"As I watch the game, I just watch everyone, and see how they're playing their defense," Camden said. "I just go in the game and shoot when I'm open – even when I miss, keep shooting."

The Blues may have needed their reserves to step up more than usual against PH. On the offensive end, the Rebels' active half-court zone defense constantly disrupted PM's rhythm. And PH had a simple, but effective, scheme to deal with the Blues' tenacious defensive pressure: namely, use the entire court.

While the Rebels still turned the ball over 32 times, only a handful of those miscues led to the transition looks that PM thrives on. The biggest impact of the press, then, may have been to wear down an opponent that couldn't match the Blues' depth.

"I thought they did a really good job of getting the ball to the middle of the floor," PM head coach Adam Gilbert said. "In the same breath, I think we were able to get to their legs a little bit. They don't have a deep bench; that was to our favor."

And the Blues' starting lineup was hardly invisible on Friday. Madison Dunlap scored 10 points and pulled down a team-best six rebounds, while Peyton Mohler added eight points and four assists. Two other starters, Hailey Huffman and Makenna Smith, chipped in five points apiece, and Huffman also notched three assists.

With so many players contributing, the Blues were able to keep the Rebels at arm's length after their big first-quarter spurt. PM led 21-8 at the end of the opening frame; the two teams

Still, for a team that's grown accustomed to competing in high-pressure situations over the past four seasons, Yarber's performance and PH's early second-half run were just the latest hurdles to leap over.

VMI (10-20 overall, 4-14 Southern Conference) took a 73-70 lead with 2:06 left in the game on a corner 3-pointer from freshman Jake Stephens. The Citadel led 46-34 at the half, but the Keydets gradually chipped away at the deficit.



Blues' Relays Both All-State *PM Boys Place 12th At Indoor Meet*

The Parry McCluer High School boys' relay teams both finished in the top three to lead several strong performances by the Blues at the Class 1 and 2 state indoor track and field meet on Monday and Tuesday of last week at Roanoke College's Cregger Center.

The 4 X 400-meter relay team placed second in 3:39.77, just over a second behind winner Maggie Walker on the 200-meter track. The Blues' time was a season best by about four seconds. PM's team members were juniors Cooper Braddy and Holden Kerr, sophomore Brenden Plogger and senior Caleb Workman. PM head coach Chris Poluikis said the Blues ran well. He said that, before the relay, which was the final race of the meet, "We felt like we had an OK shot to win it."



In the 4 X 800-meter relay last Monday, junior Dylan May teamed up with Braddy, Workman and Plogger to place third in 8:44.32. Both teams earned all-state honors by finishing in the top six.

In the team standings, the Class 1 Blues finished 12th of 39 scoring teams, tallying 18 points, one place ahead of larger Class 2 school James River (12). Maggie Walker, which will move up to Class 3 next year, won the meet with 99 points. Auburn placed second with 43 points, and Brunswick (42) finished third.

The meet was postponed from the previous week due to wintry weather.

In the mile, May placed seventh in 4:46.91, and teammate Trevor Tomlin followed in 12th in 5:03.32.

Junior Colton Staton led the PM boys' throwers, placing seventh in the shot put with a toss of 46 feet, 5 inches, a personal record by about a foot and a half. Praising Staton for his performance, PM throwing coach Matthew Douglas said, "Colton set his mind to finish the season strong after being in a slump at the beginning of the season. He came out with what I call the eye of the tiger! A whole new focus, and marks showed."

Also competing for the Blues in the boys' shot put was sophomore Zavery Wallace, finishing 13th with a throw of 39-8.

For the PM girls, senior Sophie Dryden placed ninth in the mile in 5:47.46 and came in 16th in the 1,000-meter run in 3:34.06. In the 55-meter hurdles, senior Valencia Harden placed 11th in the preliminaries in 10.19 seconds.

In the shot put, Grayson Shields placed 11th with a throw of 31-0.5. "Grayson is coming along nicely," Douglas said.

The PM girls did not score any points to place in the team

standings. Maggie Walker won the girls' meet with 110 points, and East Rockingham and Glenvar each scored 40 points to tie for second place.

Reviewing the throwing season, Douglas said, "I think we had a really good indoor season. I believe that it was a nice start and a lot of progress was made that will definitely carry in to the outdoor season. ... It's going to be fun to see this young group of kids grow and get better."

Practice starts this week for outdoor track and field. Some of the Blues' distance runners will switch from shorter distances to the 2-mile. The Blues also look forward to welcoming back freshman Kensey May, who swam this winter, for distance races. May placed second at the state cross country meet last fall. From the PM girls basketball team, the Blues will add two seniors who were all-state performers from last year's outdoor season: middle-distance runner Hailey Huffman and thrower Tristen Clark. After a strong boys basketball season, senior Jason VanBrocklin returns as a thrower.

In the Valley District opener, the Rockbridge County High School volleyball team earned a 3-0 win over Waynesboro on Thursday night in Lexington.

After a tight first set in their only match last week, the Wildcats (10-1) jumped out to a 6-0 lead and quickly took the second set. Waynesboro (1-7 overall, 0-1 district) briefly led early in the third set before it was tied 5-5, but the Wildcats then went on a 7-0 run and didn't trail again, capturing the 25-21, 25-10, 25-16 victory.

Graceon Armstrong led RC with 21 kills and 10 digs, Jaydyn Clemmer added 15 kills, 14 digs and two aces; and freshman McKenzie Hines adapted well to her new role as libero, collecting 13 digs. Krissy Whitesell had 32 assists and 11 digs, and Jaden McCoy served up five aces.

Hines, who had played a bit as libero in the Endless Summer Classic tournament in Virginia Beach the previous weekend, was stepping in for Emma Lawson, who started in the defensive position earlier this season but was out for an undisclosed injury. RC head coach Amanda McCoy said she was proud of how Hines adjusted. "With that newness comes some errors," McCoy said. She's getting used to some things, but she did a really good job of really adapting to the position and stepping into a pretty big role."

Waynesboro's leaders were Jada Keene with nine kills and nine digs, Cierra Bruce with 14 assists and nine digs, and Paige Smith with nine digs.

McCoy said the Lady Giants, whom the Wildcats had beaten handily last season, "definitely have improved, and I think that they were able to get us out of sys-

go up by seven points, and the Lady Giants did not threaten a comeback. The match ended with a kill from Armstrong and an ace from Whitesell.


