'Ghost town' no more

As restrictions ease, events return to Manassas

At this time last year, the events that Manassas partly relies on to bring money and tourists into its Old Town were being called off. First it was St. Patrick's Day, then First Fridays and finally the annual July 4 festivities.

"It was such a ghost town for so long," said Debbie Haight, executive director of Historic

Manassas Inc., the city's tourism arm. "It was really scary."

Fast forward a year, and city officials and business owners are expecting a boon from the return of these events, along with the full

Increased use of disinfectants gums up the works at county plants

Staff at the H.L. Mooney Advanced Water Reclamation Facility in Woodbridge could see the problem developing early in the pandemic.

Just months after schools and workplaces closed in March last year, workers were noticing more of a common foe for wastewater plants everywhere: the disinfectant wipe.

"We had been monitoring visually once per week, and we started visually seeing more and

more wipes in the sanitary sewer. And where you actually see them is at this pumping station where you're seeing the sewage," said Keenan Howell, director of communications for the Prince William County Service Authority, which operates the facility.

The problem was most visible at machines called channel grinder impellers. Effectively, pumps spin wastewater in a centrifuge, separating solids from liquids as a grinder cuts up any solids.

Police seek to expand crisis unit Counselors join officers in de-escalation efforts

Prince William County is hoping to expand its crisis-intervention services in the police department.

The county's new co-responder unit, which started Dec. 7, is looking to increase its services through the proposed budget for fiscal 2022, which starts July 1.

The program pairs emergency services clinicians with a police officer certified in crisis intervention to respond to calls of crisis throughout the county.

The program fits in a larger push nationwide to reform police responses and improve mental health services. Criminal justice advocates have been supporting measures throughout the country to divert people with mental health problems from the legal system.

"Our goal is to respond to anyone who is a person in crisis no matter what that crisis may be," said Heather Baxter, a licensed professional counselor with the unit. "We don't want to just pigeonhole this into mental health; it's any person who is in crisis."

The unit can respond to a variety of calls ranging from a crash to a mental breakdown.

"We're keeping it pretty broad," said Lt. Mike Day, one of the unit's

Mall Pall

Local shopping centers will have smaller tax bills as assessments plummet

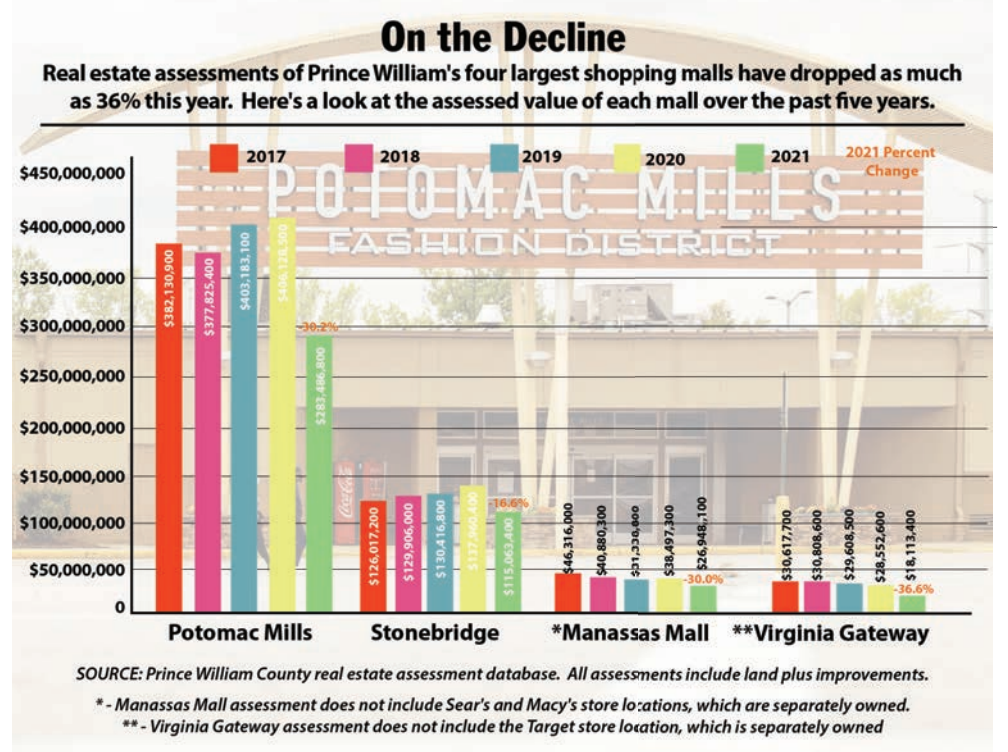

If you own a mall in Prince William County, the value of that asset is a lot lower today than it was a year ago, but so is your tax bill.

The combined value of the four largest malls in the county fell by more than \$167 million this year, according to recently released county assessments. The county's retail hubs are far from unique: Across the United States, big malls were experiencing declining sales and property valuations long before anyone heard of COVID-19.

But the pandemic has led to the steepest decline in mall values yet. According to a Bloomberg analysis of 118 retail-anchored property appraisals, U.S. malls have fallen in value by an average of 60%.

For the four biggest malls in Prince William – Potomac Mills, Stonebridge at Potomac Town Center, Manassas Mall and Gateway Center – the drop in assessments was smaller, but all told the four properties fell in assessed



value by 27.4% in one year. Assessments and appraisals differ in the scope and detail used to formulate a property's value, but both are attempts to get to the present value of a property in lieu of a sale.

In all four Prince William cases, the value of the underlying land remained largely flat between 2020 and 2021 assessments, but the

value of the land's improvements fell by more than half for both Manassas Mall and Stonebridge, in Woodbridge. The biggest mall in the county, Potomac Mills, saw its overall valuation slashed from \$406.1 million to \$283.4 million.
