Study To Look At Jail Needs

RRJ Joining With Allegheny To Hire Assessors

The Rockbridge Regional Jail Commission, in a partnership with the Allegheny Regional Jail, has released a request for proposals (RFP) to procure services to conduct a needs assessment of the region's jail facilities.

"This RFP will address, to the west of us and to our jurisdiction, current need and future need, and it'll address how we prepare for that need, whether we build, whether we renovate, whether we simply add on, whether we do nothing," Rockbridge Regional Jail Superintendent Derek Almarode said in an interview Tuesday. "I don't think that's going to be the outcome. Something's going

to happen." The Rockbridge area's jail at 258 Greenhouse Road was built in 1987 and was designed to accommodate 56 inmates. Almarode said in a presentation to Lexington City Council last Thursday that the jail currently houses about 115 inmates.

"Jails are communities within communities," Almarode said Tuesday. "I need bed space,

Masks Going Optional

Local School Divisions Follow New State Law

Buena Vista schools moved to a "mask-optional" learning environment Monday, the first of the area's school systems to do so.

Lexington and Rockbridge County parents will have the option to send their students to school without masks starting next Monday, Feb. 28.

The local decisions followed the signing of SB 739 by Gov. Glenn Youngkin last week, legislation that bars school divisions from imposing mask mandates.

Amendments were added to the legislation Wednesday that allowed the legislation to take effect immediately and set March 1 as the date when school mask mandates across the state must end.

During the Lexington School Board's regular meeting last Wednesday night, the Board unanimously voted to follow SB 739 and removed masks from its school mitigation measures, effective Feb.

On Thursday, Buena Vista followed suit in a special called meeting, but moved up its mask-optional start date to this past Monday.

Rockbridge County announced its decision to move to a mask-optional learning environment via a Facebook post Thursday, aligning its start date with that of Lexington's, Feb. 28.

Though masks are no longer required for K-12 in-school instruction under SB 739, federal law still requires masks to be worn on buses.

Buena Vista Superintendent Dr. Tony Francis told the School Board last week, "It does not supersede the federal mandate concerning transportation which is still in

place that requires everyone to wear a mask while transported to school."

Lexington Superintendent Rebecca Walters stated, "The federal mandate for everyone

to wear a mask while riding on school transportation, which includes our shuttle bus, remains in effect until March 8."

Spotswood Proposals Review Starting

Public Invited To Submit Questions

Lexington City Council is about to begin the process of selecting a developer for the city-owned property on Spotswood Avenue, and it wants the public to partici-

On Tuesday, March 1, at 5:30 p.m., Council will meet with the two developers that have submitted proposals for the property in a work session. Council has invited members of the community to submit questions about the developers to Council members prior to the meet-

"We are really hoping that the residents and citizens here in the community will see their Council members and say, 'Hey, these are the important issues and important questions I'd like you to discuss with the developers, or discuss as a body that day and maybe into the future," City Manager Jim Halasz said yesterday. "We really want the participation and input from the public in that way."

Halasz said that members of the community are also invited to attend the work session and submit their questions to Council in writing then, too.

"They can also come to the meetings, and if they have a question that comes up, they can put that question in writing and provide it to City Council, so that there's some opportunity for Council to discuss it, or, if it seems beneficial, to address that to the developers," he said

But he hopes that the public's participation will not impede the productivity of the meeting.

"We don't want the public disrupting the flow of that

Grant For BV Collective Garners Support Youngkin


A \$700,000 Appalachian Regional Commission grant has been recommended for approval by Gov. Glenn Youngkin for the Buena Vista-based Virginia Innovation Collective.

The collective is The Advancement Foundation's agricultural technology center that is being developed in the former Mundet-Hermetite factory building at 245 W. 21st St. The ARC funding is to go for developing a commercial kitchen, new bathrooms that are Americans with Disabilities Act-compliant and other renovations to the business incubator facility.

TAF acquired the 39,000-square-foot former factory building last year with the intention of providing space, guidance and training to business startups in order to spur economic development in downtown Buena Vista. "We're very excited about this grant likely being awarded," said Tom Roberts, Buena Vista's director of community and economic development.

TAF was earlier awarded a \$500,000 Go Virginia grant that is being used for programs and staffing. A

The Fourth of July weekend was packed with various local celebrations that drew large crowds. Braving through some minor hiccups, these celebrations gave local residents and visitors a memorable time.

Those events included the Balloons Over Rockbridge Hot Air Balloon and Music Festival, the Freedom Food Festival and Fourth of July Children's Bike Parade in Lexington, Goshen's first July 4th Beach Party, and music and fireworks in Buena Vista.

Balloons Over Rockbridge co-director Beth Armstrong estimated that at least 8,000 people attended the festival over Saturday and Sunday, July 2 and 3.

"We had great bands both days," Armstrong said. Vendors also seemed to be pleased with their business, she continued.

Due to unfavorable weather conditions, balloons couldn't fly on Saturday night or Sunday morning.

"We had put in our schedule an extra spot in case we needed it," Balloons Over Rockbridge co-director Dee Miriello said. Prospective passengers were rescheduled

to the extra slot on Monday morning. A total of 195 passengers booked balloon flights.

"Beautiful flights, so in the end we had enough people from both of those cancelled flights to fill those flights Monday morning on the 4th," Miriello said.

Missing Teenager Found In Michigan

19-Year-Old Charged With Abduction

A Michigan man was arrested last week in connection with a missing juvenile from Rockbridge County who was found safe in Michigan.

According to a statement from the Rockbridge County Sheriff's Office last Wednesday evening, the office had been notified the previous Monday evening of a 15-year-old female juvenile who had gone missing from the Goose Creek Road area of Rockbridge County. Sheriff's deputies and investigators immediately responded to the scene and began an investigation.

Based on the information and evidence that was gathered at the scene, sheriff's deputies and investigators were able to obtain and execute several social media/internet site/internet service type search warrants to help gather digital evidence and location information related to the missing juvenile, according to the RCSO statement.

After collecting and analyzing the digital evidence, investigators contacted the Kalamazoo Police Department in Michigan for assistance in locating the missing juvenile and a possible suspect. The Kalamazoo Police Department went to a residence in the Hawley Street



Suspect Killed Resisting Arrest

Man Pointed Gun At Deputies, Say Police

A Rockbridge County man was shot and killed by deputies at a Timber Ridge area residence Friday night after he pointed a firearm at them as they were seeking to make an arrest, according to a statement from the Rockbridge County Sheriff's Office this week.

The suspect, Michael Fredric Stevens, 57, died at the scene.

The sheriff's office said the deputies responded to a residence in Lee Hi Acres at approximately 10 p.m. on Dec. 9, following reports of "a wanted subject at the residence."

The deputies arrived with arrests warrants, and made contact with Stevens who retreated into a bedroom in the home and would not respond to requests by the deputies that he come out and speak to them.

After speaking with negotiators, Stevens exited the room at approximately 11 p.m. and pointed a firearm at the deputies in the hallway, according to the police statement. The deputies fired their weapons, hitting Stevens. Emergency medical services were called to treat Stevens, but he died at the scene.

Project Proceeding

Echelon Permit Request Goes To Council

The Lexington City Planning Commission last Thursday voted 4-2 to approve a conditional use permit for Echelon Resources Inc. to develop a parcel of land on Spotswood Drive, despite protests from the public.

Edwin Gaskin, the project manager for Echelon, presented a preliminary site plan to the Commission as part of his applicant statement, noting that this was unusual for this stage of the project, but with the site being so small "every inch counts" and Echelon was working on incorporating required elements

now so that there wouldn't be "significant changes at a later date."

The current plan for the proposed development calls for 62 apartments - 41 single-bedroom units and 21 two-bedroom units. The apartments, which will be market-rate apartments and not affordable housing units, will be located in a building consisting of three full stories and a fourth, partial level to best utilize the terrain of the lot. The site will also hold a parking lot with up to 84 spaces for

The exterior of the building incorporates "more of a modern look," Gaskin noted, because, "frankly, we wanted to differentiate it from historic Lexington. It's a new site, a new construction; it's an opportunity to have a new era of aesthetic appeal." He also noted that the idea was to "play off of" the more modern design of the hospital and to "create sort of a transition cosmetic from that to the more traditional Lexington look."

Gaskin noted that a number of changes had
