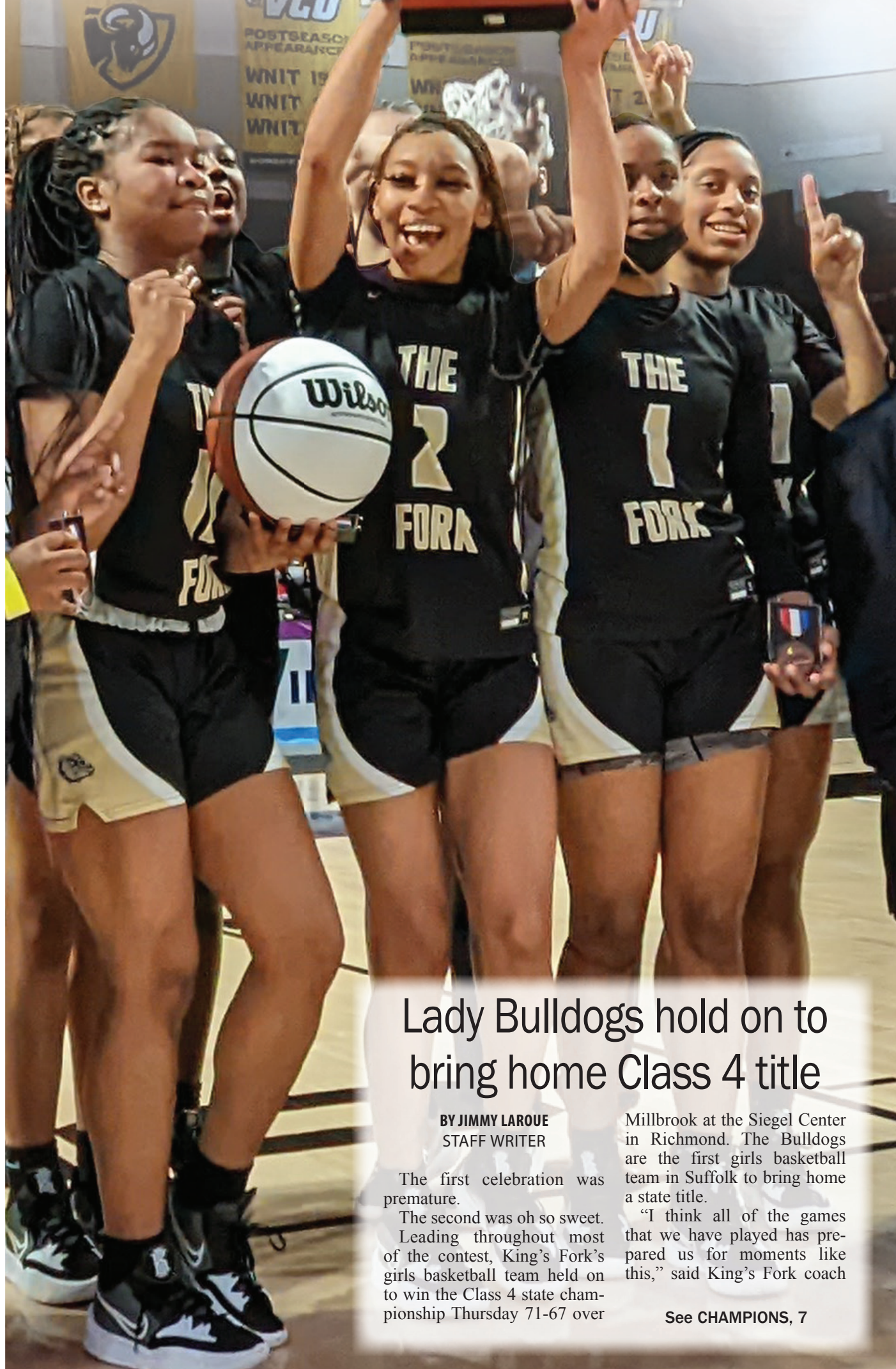

## Former players share in glory

While King's Fork girls basketball coach Maurice Fofana is praising his current team for their efforts in wrapping up an epic season with a Class 4 state championship, he made sure to share the glory with former players on his team that reached the 2021 game but fell just short.

That group, which finished the season lost by a single point to Moravia, did the same interview in a friendly battle," Fofana said.

They were among the first people cheering the Bulldogs at the Siegel Center in Richmond. King's Fork pulled out the victory over Millbrook to cap a championship season at 23-1, the first time a Suffolk school won a girls basketball state championship.

Fofana said all of his players wanted to win for him, even though he stressed that as he did as a player for Nansmond River, it was a state championship team, they had to get one for themselves.

"They wanted to win it for themselves just like the kid Camary Harris was one of the ones that, right at the end of the game in '17, made a putback," Fofana said. "But she won her first MEAC championship ring, she called me and said 'Coach, this ring is for you.'"

Harris, a first-team, all-league player during her senior season at King's Fork that wrapped up with the title game loss, was named to the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference all-rookie team in her first season, when her Beaufort Cookman team won the conference tournament and reached the NCAA tournament. She wrapped up her senior season in college.

The first celebration was premature. The second was oh so sweet. Leading throughout most of the contest, King's Fork's girls basketball team held on to win the Class 4 state championship Thursday 71-67 over

Millbrook at the Siegel Center in Richmond. The Bulldogs are the first girls basketball team in Suffolk to bring home a state title. "I think all of the games that we have played has prepared us for moments like this," said King's Fork coach

# Champs: Bulldogs keep calm, hold off Millbrook

Maurice Fofana. "We had some tight moments in the region. We played a tight one the other night. We were prepared for all of this."

Cyriah Griffin, who scored 12 points and had 13 assists while playing all 32 minutes, clinched the title for the Bulldogs with her basket with 14 seconds remaining.

King's Fork (23-3) was eager to celebrate the state title, and after a scramble around the Millbrook basket, initially began celebrating and the rest of the team spilled onto the court, thinking time had expired as the horn sounded. However, 2.3 seconds were put back on the clock, and King's Fork had to hold on to officially begin the festivities.

Four Bulldogs, including Griffin, scored in double figures, led by Yasmine Brown's 15 points and Niyah Gaston's 13 points, which included three 3-pointers, and Kiana Brittain with 12 points, eight rebounds and six blocked shots. Arlisha Boston added nine points.

Though Gaston was slow to get untracked, once more she hit a pair of crucial 3-pointers in the fourth quarter as Millbrook closed in on the lead King's Fork held for nearly 30 of the game's 32 minutes.

Despite leading for much of the game, it took about a half for King's Fork to find its bearings from the floor, hitting just 42.3% of its shots, going 11-for-26, in the opening 16 minutes.

The second half was another matter.

The Bulldogs hit 65.2% of their shots in the second half, going 15-for-23.

"We are used to playing on a high school floor, which is different," Fofana said. "The baskets are different. Nothing's behind it. Most all high schools have the wall behind it. It does affect the kids' shot sometimes."

Millbrook (25-3) scored the first basket, but its lead lasted just eight seconds, and it never led again, though it kept the game close. The Bulldogs never led by more than 12 points, and led by nine at halftime, 29-20.

The Pioneers cut the lead to three by the end of the third quarter on 61.5% shooting, going 8-for-13, and it set up for a frenetic final eight minutes as both teams battled

for a state championship. Millbrook got King's Fork's lead down to two, at 54-52, with about 5 minutes remaining, and got within one possession on several occasions and again cut it to two, at 69-67, on a basket from Kenni Rooks with 18 seconds left.

The Bulldogs' defensive pressure, however, kept the Pioneers just out of reach, and Griffin beat Avery O'Roke to the ball at midcourt, with her layup providing the final margin.

"It was about who wanted it more, and I wanted the ball, I wanted this more," Griffin said.

Millbrook coach Eric Green Sr. praised the Bulldogs, saying they were just a little bit better than his team and took advantage of their weaknesses. He said in the latter stages, the Pioneers were tiring. "They jumped out on us, and we were able to fight back, and we just were never able to overcome that little, two or three-point lead that they kept on us," Green said.

Fofana was grateful to have that advantage to work with.

"It's always good to be ahead because you always ... have that little cushion, and we like that," Fofana said. "We haven't had a lot of close games where we were behind and had to fight to get up."

King's Fork focused on taking Millbrook standout O'Roke out of her game, and it worked. Though she had 13 points, most of them came from the free-throw line as she shot just 3-for-16 from the field.

"I feel like I had an idea of what she wanted to do," Brown said. "I

watched film last night, I watched film this morning and I watched film on the way to the game this morning. And she seemed to go left a lot. And so if you're already anticipating going left, you're already there to cut her off. She could go right, but she didn't go right a whole lot. She wants to go left and go all the way to the basket, so it's easier to guard her knowing that she wants to go left."

Just a sophomore, Griffin was important in keeping the Pioneers off-balance throughout the game and showed her mettle in the moment.

"She knew when to push, and she knew when to back off," Fofana said. "So we felt like we were in control of the game the whole time."

Millbrook had five players score in double-figures — Hannah Stephanites (15), Kaylene Todd (14), O'Roke (13), Jaliah Jackson (12) and Rooks (11).

But it wasn't quite enough for a Pioneers team not quite used to seeing, on a game-in, game-out basis, the pressure and athleticism King's Fork brings.

"We played against some tough teams that put pressure on us," Green said, "But when you don't see it all the time, when it does hit you, it takes a while to get adjusted. Give them kudos for the excellent defensive pressure that they applied and made us have to make adjustments."

Fofana, who played on the Nansemond River boys team that won the 1995 state title, and who coached King's Fork to the title game in 2017 — some of them were in

the Siegel Center stands watching Thursday - said the win means a lot to him, and he remembered what it was like in the interview room five years ago falling short in the title game.

This visit to the interview room was much sweeter.

"It's amazing, man," Fofana said. "I don't really know how I should feel, but I tell you, I feel great. It's big, and for me, always preaching to the kids that, 'Hey, listen, I've won one. You get you one.'"

They listened, and they got one.

And King's Fork, and Suffolk, now has a girls basketball state champion.

# Former players share in glory

While King's Fork girls basketball coach Maurice Fofana was praising his current team for their efforts in wrapping up an epic season with a Class 4 state championship, he made sure to shout out his team that reached the 2017 title game but fell just short.

"All the young ladies that were sitting behind our bench that were pulling for us were some of the young ladies that sat here in '17 and did the same interview in a losing battle," Fofana said.

They were among the loudest people cheering the Bulldogs on in the Siegel Center in Richmond as King's Fork pulled out the 71-67 victory over Millbrook to cap their championship season at 23-3. It is the first time a Suffolk school has won a girls basketball state championship.

a strong note, scoring 17 points in a win against Florida A&M. It was her fourth-straight game — and sixth in seven games — in which she scored in double-figures.

Fofana noted how special the 2017 team was, and what they still mean to him. And he acknowledged how much he wanted the championship for the four seniors on the team — Amelion Pierce,

Zamyia Rodgers, Yasmine Brown and Terrana Thornton — and for the team two years ago that made it to the region tournament and the other that didn't get to play last season due to COVID-19.

“These young ladies that we have have played at a high level throughout their basketball career,” Fofana said, “so it wasn't a situation where I felt like that they were going

to give up or not be able to fight it out 'til the end. There was no doubt they were going to fight it out. We had no reason not to leave it all out there. We had four seniors, and we wanted to do it for them, for the young ladies that were here their freshman year. ... we had a chance to move on and advance.”

And just as he praised the current team as special and deserving cham-

pions, he said all of the previous teams and players share in the current team's accomplishment.

“It's just been amazing for me,” Fofana said.. I've had great kids throughout my career, and they are more than deserving for this, because this is not just for me and the young ladies that are here now, it's for all of our kids.”

# NR girls track wins state title

Just as it had done during the indoor track season, Nansmond River's girls track team captured the Class 5 state championship, dominating the field with nearly 30 points separating it from its next closest competitor.

Like the indoor state championship meet, it was the same two teams finishing first and second, with the Warriors topping everyone with 89 points ahead of Glen Allen (60 points), Stone Bridge (56.5), Maury (47) and Prince George (43) rounding out the top five teams in Friday

# Track: Nansemond River girls won both indoor and outdoor title this year

and Saturday's championships at Todd Stadium in Newport News.

"We knew if they were to execute what we had been working on all season, we had a good chance to come out on top," said Nansemond River track coach Marco McKoy.

They were led by a pair of individual first-place finishes from Sydney Ellis in the 100-meter hurdles and the 300-meter hurdles. She was also on the first-place 4x400 meter relay team with Ansolei Taliaferro, Trinity Lucas and Nyah Harrison. Ellis' time in the 100 hurdles is the third-fastest in the state this year, according to McKoy, and her time in the 300 hurdles the fourth-fastest in the state.

The girls' 4x400 relay team is the top relay team in the state.

Jalayah Person also won a state title in the 400, with the second-fastest time in the state and 10th fastest in school history. She also finished second in the 200 and had a pair of third-place finishes in the long jump and the triple jump. Person, along with Taliaferro, Peyton Wright and Kiara Mahoney took second in the 4x100 relay.

Grace Flynn finished second in the high jump, while Taliaferro and Harrison had third-place finishes in the 300 hurdles and 400, respectively. Harrison also scored in the 200 with an eighth-place finish.

"We did have some performances that went above and beyond, and I think that is one of the things that separates these ladies from a lot of other competitors is that when they get to crunch time, they know how to elevate themselves to have a stronger performance than what was expected," McKoy said.

With just two seniors leaving — Ellis and Taliaferro — the Warriors' girls track program looks to be primed for future success, but he cautioned against them becoming complacent with a region full of strong teams and competitors. McKoy said the team, however, has freshmen and sophomores who are ready to step up.

Nansemond River's boys couldn't quite duplicate its indoor state championship, as McKoy said they were battling injuries — one in particular to Savion Wingate, whose strong indoor performances helped the Warriors win a state championship this winter — but it still had a strong showing, coming in third overall with 48 points, behind first-place L.C. Bird (67) and Glen Allen (63).

"I was extremely happy because they did finish higher than what they were projected to finish," McKoy said.

The Warriors' Deondre Hardy captured state titles in the 110 hurdles and triple jump, and Charles Wall-Davis had a pair of second-place finishes, taking second in the 300 hurdles and coming just behind Hardy in the 110 hurdles. Hady's time in the 110 hurdles is the fastest time in the state and third-fastest in school history, and he has the second-longest triple jump in

school history. Wall-Davis' time in the 110 hurdles is the third-fastest in the state.

"Deondre always sets the tone for us," McKoy said. "He's been our tone-setter for a while now. ... He's shown everybody in the

state that he's one of the best athletes there is."

McKoy said Wall-Davis' performances were impressive, especially since the state meet was just the second time sprinting since missing a month of the

season with an injury. He said both Wall-Davis and Hardy have pushed each other to stronger performances.

"To get two second-place finishes tells you just how good this young man is

going to be in the future," McKoy said.

Hardy, who also took third in the long jump, teamed up with Andres White, Nicholas Grier and Christopher Griffin to finish third in the 4x100 relay.

King's Fork's girls had a solid sixth-place finish in the Class 4 state championship track meet at Liberty University in Lynchburg last Friday and Saturday, scoring 36 points as Heritage of Newport News won the state title.

The Bulldogs were led by a state championship meet record 46.93 seconds in the 4x400 meter relay from Deja Ward, Taylor Spruill, Courtney Johnson and Asia Powell. By more than a second, they broke the meet record that had been set by King's Fork in last year's meet. Three of them — Ward, Powell and Johnson — were on last year's relay that set the mark.

A quartet of Lakeland girls earned a state cham-

pionship of their own, as Kamryn Monroe, Kimari Rountree, Jamauri Demiel, Brianna Goodman won the 4x400 relay at the Class 3 state championship meet at Liberty University. The same four also finished second in the 4x100 relay. Rountree had a third-place finish in the 300 hurdles.

For the Cavaliers' boys, Justin Royez was the top finisher, taking third in the shot put.

The strong performances, evidenced by at least one first-place individual or relay finish from all three of the city's public high schools at their respective state championship meets,

"Over the last couple of years, the city of Suffolk has made some investments back into athletics, particularly track," McKoy said, "and I just think it's going to pay off even more in the future."

## NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC OF VIRGINIA ELECTRIC AND POWER COMPANY'S REQUEST TO REVISE ITS FUEL FACTOR CASE NO. PUR-2022-00064

•Virginia Electric and Power Company ("Dominion") has filed its application pursuant to § 56-249.6 of the Code of Virginia seeking to increase its fuel factor from 2.0448 cents per kilowatt hour ("¢/kWh") to 3.5379¢/kWh, effective for usage on and after July 1, 2022.

•According to Dominion, the total proposed fuel factor would increase the average weighted monthly bill of a residential customer using 1,000 kWh of electricity per month by \$14.93, or approximately 12.2%.

•A Hearing Examiner appointed by the Commission will hold a telephonic hearing in this case on July 6, 2022, at 10 a.m. for the receipt of public witness testimony.

•An evidentiary hearing will be held on July 7, 2022, at 10 a.m., in the Commission's second floor courtroom located in the Tyler Building, 1300 East Main Street, Richmond, VA 23219, to receive the testimony and evidence of the Company, any respondents, and the Staff.

On May 5, 2022, Virginia Electric and Power Company ("Company" or "Dominion") filed with the State Corporation Commission ("Commission") its application ("Application") pursuant to § 56-249.6 of the Code of Virginia seeking an increase in its fuel factor from 2.0448 cents per kilowatt hour ("¢/kWh") to 3.5379¢/kWh, effective for usage on and after July 1, 2022.

The Company's proposed fuel factor, reflected in Fuel Charge Rider A, consists of both current and prior period factors. The Company's proposed current period factor for Fuel Charge Rider A of 3.0784¢/kWh is designed to recover the Company's estimated Virginia jurisdictional fuel expenses, including purchased power expenses, of approximately \$2.278 billion for the period July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023 ("Rate Year"). The Company's proposed prior period factor for Fuel Charge Rider A of 0.4595¢/kWh is designed to collect approximately one-third of the Company's \$1.020 billion projected fuel deferral balance as of June 30, 2022, or \$288.8 million as adjusted for a proposed accounting change ("Three-Year Mitigation proposal"). The amount of \$288.8 million represents one-third of \$866.5 million, which is the Company's calculation of its fuel deferral balance as of June 30, 2022, adjusted to exclude fuel costs associated with Dominion's customers under certain market-based rate ("MBR") schedules. The Company asserts this adjustment does not impact the proposed fuel rates for non-MBR customers.

In total, Dominion's proposed fuel factor (under its Three Year Mitigation proposal) represents a 1.4931¢/kWh increase from the fuel factor rate presently in effect of 2.0448¢/kWh which was approved by the Commission in Case No. PUR-2021-00097. According to the Company, this proposal would result in an annual fuel revenue increase of approximately \$1.105 billion over the Rate Year. The total proposed fuel factor would increase the average weighted monthly bill of a residential customer using 1,000 kWh of electricity by \$14.93, or approximately 12.2%.

Dominion's proposed fuel factor of 3.5379¢/kWh represents one of three potential fuel rates presented by the Company for the Rate Year. As described in the Application, the Company presented another alternative in which one-half of the Company's \$1.020 billion projected fuel deferral balance as of June 30, 2022 would be collected from the Company's customers during the Rate Year; the remainder would be collected during the period July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2024 ("Two-Year Mitigation proposal"). In the final alternative, the projected \$1.020 billion fuel deferral balance would be fully recovered during the Rate Year ("Full Recovery proposal"). The Application presents each of these alternative treatments of this deferral balance for the Commission's consideration.

In sum, Dominion states that the total fuel factor for the three alternative recovery proposals is as follows: (1) 4.4568¢/kWh for Full Recovery; (2) 3.5379¢/kWh for the Three-Year Mitigation; and (3) 3.7676¢/kWh for the Two-Year Mitigation. Implementation of the Three-Year and Two-Year Mitigation proposals would result in an annual fuel revenue increase of approximately \$1.105 billion or \$1.275 billion, respectively, over the Rate Year. Implementation of the full recovery rate would result in an annual fuel revenue increase of approximately \$1.785 billion over the Rate Year.

For a residential customer using 1,000 kWh per month, the average weighted monthly bill would increase under the three alternative recovery proposals as follows: (1) increase \$24.12 from \$122.01 to \$146.13, or by 19.8%, based on the Full Recovery proposal; (2) increase \$14.93 from \$122.01 to \$136.94, or by 12.2%, based on the Three-Year Mitigation proposal; and (3) increase \$17.23 from \$122.01 to \$139.24, or by 14.1%, based on the Two-Year Mitigation proposal.

The hearing of this matter will occur subsequent to July 1, 2022—the beginning of the Company's 2022-2023 fuel year. Consequently, the Commission has authorized the Company, at its election, to place its proposed fuel factor of 3.5379¢/kWh into effect on an interim basis for usage on and after July 1, 2022.

The Commission has taken judicial notice of the ongoing public health issues related to the spread of the coronavirus, or COVID-19. In accordance therewith, all pleadings, briefs, or other documents required to be served in this matter shall be submitted electronically to the extent authorized by 5 VAC 5-20-150, *Copies and format*, of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure ("Rules of Practice"). Confidential and Extraordinarily Sensitive Information shall not be submitted electronically and should comply with 5 VAC 5-20-170, *Confidential information*, of the Rules of Practice. Any person seeking to hand deliver and physically file or submit any pleading or other document shall contact the Clerk's Office Document Control Center at (804) 371-9838 to arrange the delivery.

Pursuant to 5 VAC 5-20-140, *Filing and service*, of the Commission's Rules of Practice, the Commission has directed that service on parties and the Commission's Staff in this matter shall be accomplished by electronic means.
