OUR BURNT OFFERING

There are five offerings given in the first seven chapters of Leviticus, which help show our relationship to the Lord. The sin offering shows us how to get right with God while the others show how to stay right with Him.

These Old Testament offerings illustrate the work of the Lord Jesus for our union and communion with God. The Sin Offering is God's offering to us, which takes care of our eternity. The Burnt Offering is our offering to the Lord, which takes care of this life. It is not until we are ready to die that we know how to live.

The Burnt Offering shows our dedication to the Lord. Only after we understand Christ dies for us are we able to live for Him. This offering is our gift to come and follow Him. Our fellowship is a lifelong process of getting to know our Lord, through our surrender and service to Him. The different types of animals that can be sacrificed range from an expensive ox to turtle doves free for the catching. All of us can dedicate time, talents and treasures, whether it is the two mites as the widow or the abundance of the wealthy. Too many Christians are saved from Hell, but not saved unto the Lord. It is like having a partner in marriage without having a partnership. We give our sins to God, yet not our lives. We know what it cost Christ to save us, but what has it cost us to serve Him?

There are many differences between the Sin and Burnt Offerings. The animal sacrifice for sin has its organs that are deemed unclean removed due to its bodily fluids and excrement. Whereas the animal for the burnt Offering is left intact except for its blood. Only Christ is sacrificed for sin, and at our dedication we surrender all of our imperfections to the Lord. The sacrifice of sin is not totally consumed by fire, however the body for the Burnt Offering is allowed to burn on the alter all night allowing a total consumption. The Lord wants all of us all of the time. If He is not Lord of all, He is not Lord at all.

When Christians reach Heaven, the Lord will not be looking for medals, awards or accomplishments, but instead for scars from our service. Abraham is asked by Jehovah to offer Isaac, his son, "whom thou lovest," as a burnt offering. The word lovest is close to the word begotten or special. Abraham's love for Isaac is put to test. There is a custom in Palestine in Abraham's day, where a father sacrifices his oldest son to his god. Does Abraham love his God as much as other men love theirs? After waiting twenty-five years for a miracle, Abraham is rewarded with a son. This truly is a miracle since he is one hundred years old and his wife, Sara, is ninety. The apple of Abraham's eye is his son by promise. He is willing to sacrifice anything that will come between him and his God. The Lord does not want Isaac, it is Abraham He wants. It is King David who says, ". . . Neither will I offer a burnt offering unto the LORD my God of that which doth cost me nothing."

When we stand before the Lord, what sacrifices, service or scars will we present to the Lord as a token of our love for Him. It will cost us nothing to receive Christ as our Savior, but it will cost us everything to serve Him. When Noah enters the ark, he gives up everything, however, when he leaves the ark, he gains everything.
