Building a pathway to US citizenship

Blacksburg woman working to help other fellow Afghan vets secure asylum

Azizgul Ahmadi developed a taste for turkey subs while working at a Blacksburg sandwich shop.

She layered tomatoes, lettuce and cheese on a sub roll. They have so many breads in America, she would tell friends. Rye bread, wheat bread, hot dog buns. In Afghanistan, she only ate traditional Afghan flatbread.

tnen Anmadi was ngnting the Taliban. She was a member of the elite Female Tactical Platoon, or FTP, working shoulder to shoulder with the U.S. Special Forces in Afghanistan.

Ahmadi and her younger sister fled Afghanistan in August 2021, when the capital of Kabul was overrun by the Taliban following the chaotic withdrawal of United States military forces. She and other FTP women came to the United States, where they have lived in a state of limbo ever since.

Ahmadi and fellow FTP veterans are making Blacksburg their home, but the majority of the women who served in the platoon have yet to have their asylum applications approved by United States Citizenship and Immigration Services, and they worry that they will be deported back to a county where they would most likely be killed or tortured by the Taliban, which rules Afghanistan.

Israel: 13 hostages, 4 others released

KHAN YOUNIS, Gaza Strip - Israel began releasing 39 Palestinian prisoners on Sunday following Hamas' release of 13 Israelis and four foreigners in the second round of swaps under a cease-fire deal, the Israeli military said, after the militant group initially delayed the exchange for hours and claimed Israel violated the terms of a truce deal.

Hamas released a video showing the hostages appearing shaken but mostly in good physical condition as masked militants led them to Red Cross vehicles headed out of Gaza. Some hostages waved goodbye to the militants.

The Israeli military said the released hostages, including
